





**July 25th World Day for Grandparents
and the Elderly**

The decision to hold a World Day for Grandparents and Older People has come at a time marked by a pandemic and by the suffering of our older generations in recent months in every part of the world.

The theme chosen by the Holy Father, “I am with you always”, expresses clearly that, during the pandemic and in the better times that will hopefully follow, every ecclesial community wishes to be with the elderly always.

A visit is an opportunity for a grandchild to say to his or her grandparent and for a young person to say to an elderly person they are visiting, “I am with you always”.

As individuals, we can do a lot for the elderly: pray for them, cure the disease of loneliness, activate networks for the elderly and much more.

The Pope wrote clearly about this. He said, “We have seen what happened to the elderly in certain places in our world as a result of the coronavirus. They did not have to die that way.” These are important words that deserve to be raised up again. They can help us to reflect on the debt that families—and family pastoral care—owe to a generation that has in some respects fallen into oblivion.


