**January 15, 2023**  
**Second Sunday in Ordinary Time**  
**“Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world”**

Because God formed John the Baptist “as his servant from the womb,” John’s whole being is ordered to God. Thus, when John “saw Jesus coming toward him,” he instantly cried out, Behold, the Lamb of God.” John immediately recognizes that Christ is the one the world has been waiting for. This leads John to “testify that he is the Son of God.” The same grace has been given to us. By baptism, we “have been called to be holy with all those who call upon the name of the Lord.” By professing the one “who takes away the sin of the world,” we become a light to the nations, through whom God’s salvation reaches to the ends of the earth. As we glorify the Lamb of God, God shows his glory through us.

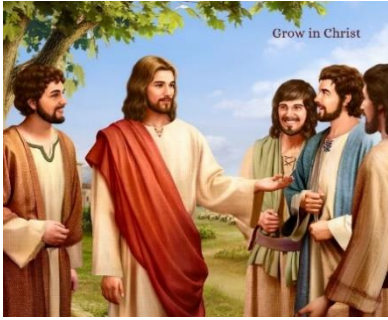

**Proud Servants of God**

“My Servant” is an identification a lot of people will shy away from. Yet, all of today’s readings describe individuals who are proud to be servants – servants of God. Isaiah became “a light to the nations”; Paul became “an apostle of Christ Jesus”; John the Baptist prepared the way so that Jesus “might be made known to Israel.”

We might not want to be a servant of another, but what a privilege it is to be called to be a servant of God, a light to others, to proclaim God’s love and make Jesus known. By our baptism, we have all been called. We enlighten others by the way we live with integrity. The unselfishness of our lives proclaims the good news of Christ Jesus. Authentic Christian living makes Him known to the world. That is what it means to be a servant of God.

**Third Sunday in Ordinary Time**  
*“Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.”*

Saint Paul urges the Corinthians to “be united in the same mind and in the same purpose” without any divisions among them, and Jesus himself chose companions as soon as he moved to Capernaum. In the unity that Simon, Andrew, James, and John experience through their friendship with Christ, they become certain that “the kingdom of heaven is at hand.” Such a unity in charity remains a compelling witness to the truth of the Gospel. Thanks to our communion in Christ, “anguish has taken wing, dispelled is darkness: for there is no gloom there but now there was distress.” To us enshrouded in the “land of gloom,” Jesus Christ beckons, “Come after me.”
