

"A Sower Went Out to Sow Some Seed."

In this familiar parable of the sower and the seed, Jesus is encouraging us to be the rich soil - to take his words to heart and let them take root in our lives. Today there are obstacles to accepting Jesus' teaching, just as there were when Jesus told this parable. Often there is brief enthusiasm, followed by a kind of spiritual short attention span. There are also temptations and troubles that

bring doubt and straying. But always Jesus invites us back, calling us to open our ears to hear God's Word. And when we respond, we become the rich soil that produces fruit - the product of a life of faith.

The story is told of a father who sat at the supper table one evening reflecting upon his life. At that time his life was in ruins. He had been divorced two years ago and his eldest son had written \$5,000 worth of bad checks. This man was living in the basement of a home and his son was coming to live with him.



The day his son came to live with him he was high on drugs, so the father put him to bed. He went back to his chair and began to pray the Our Father. He so badly wanted a relationship with his son. The next morning at breakfast he said to his son, "I know what you have done. We both know what has been wrong, but we are going to start over. You are forgiven for all the money you have stolen, for all you have done in the past and we are starting over. *I will never bring up your past. Do not repeat it. It is past.*" The Father said that was the turning point in their lives.

Jesus makes that same statement to us. "You are forgiven. Don't ever bring it up again. Forget it." WOW! Those are almost unbelievable words. What a gift! What words of consolation!

Masks in Church

The following questions have recently been asked:

1. Why wear masks in church if we are sitting 6' apart?
2. Why wear them when other churches are not requiring them?
3. When will we no longer wear them?

When we began preparations for reopening our churches the recommendation came from the Archdiocese to have all people wear masks in church. Yes, we are sitting 6' apart in church but when approaching Holy Communion and when exiting church people are not always keeping their distance. Also, it would not be safe for those distributing Holy Communion if masks were not worn.

I will continue recommending wearing masks until the Office of Worship says otherwise. It is one way to show respect and concern for other parishioners.
