August 15, 2020 – The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

*Come, let us rejoice with the angels in the Assumption of the
Virgin Mary*



Pope Benedict XVI wrote that “precisely because Mary is with God and in God, she is very close to each one of us. While she lived on this earth she could only be close to a few people. Being in God, who is actually within all of us, Mary shares in this closeness of God.” She “knows our hearts, can hear our prayers, can help us with her motherly kindness. She always listens to us and being Mother of the Son, participates in the power of the Son and in his goodness. We can always entrust the whole of our lives to this Mother.” Assumed into heaven, Mary reveals our own destiny: “That transformation of our material bodies to which we look forward one day has been accomplished – we know it now for certain – in her.”

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Sunday Readings

Isaiah 56:1, 6-7

“Observe what is right, do what is just.” Is Isaiah telling us to look at situations in our lives, discern what is right and do a just action to change it? Are today’s crises – racial, economic and environmental – offering us opportunities to discern and become prophets of change?

Romans 11:13-15, 29-32

St Paul says that the Israelites disobeyed yet received mercy; the Gentiles disobeyed and received it too. Mercy is a profound characteristic of God.

Matthew 15:21-28

Pope Francis wrote that “in the hour of trial faith brings light.” The terrible trial of a demonically tormented child could have wrecked the Canaanite woman’s spirit, weighing her down with despondency and defeat. But faith lifts her from the heaviness of hopelessness and carries her to the “holy mountain” that is Christ. The promise

proclaimed by St Paul – that God desires to have mercy on all -- moves the woman beyond the burden of fatalism and doubt. Even Christ’s silence does not dissuade her. Instead, it serves to steel her belief, showing her a new tack by which to beg for what God is eager to give her.

Living Stewardship – Pillar of Prayer

We will all experience some hurt or pain in our lives. Let us, like the Canaanite woman, run to Jesus and ask Him to have pity on us. For those in our parish who are hurting in some way...We pray to the Lord.

Reflection Questions:

- How can you become more united with your ancestors in faith?
- How can you strengthen ties with your Christ family.

PRAYER Lord, you offered the healing love and compassion of God to the sick and poor. Help me be an instrument of God's love and compassion to all people.

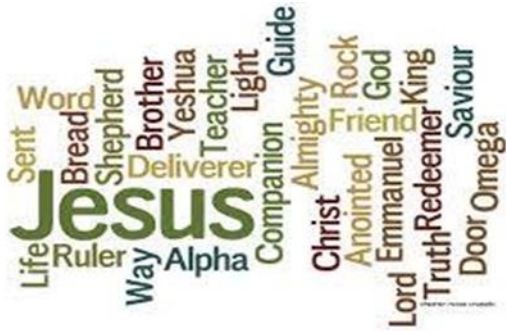

"You are Peter, and to you I will give the keys of the kingdom of heaven."



Jesus hears the rumors and gossip of the crowd that follows him. He wants to know what they are saying about his identity. While the crowds believe that Jesus might be one of the prophets come back to life, they haven't made the

conclusion that Peter has come to: that this man is in fact the anointed one they have been waiting for, the Messiah, the "Son of the living God."

This question of faith remains one that is asked of each disciple today. We have met Jesus in the word of God and in the sacraments. We have heard him proclaimed by catechists, evangelists and preachers. Still Jesus wants to know, "Who do you say that I am?"

Sunday Readings

Isaiah 22:19-23

What he opens, no one will shut, what he shuts, no one will open.

Romans 11:33-36

For from him and through him and for him are all things. To him be glory forever.

Matthew 16:13-20

Peter can declare with certainty that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of the Living God, because God himself had chosen Peter and prepared him for a new and unique vocation. Only God, with his "unsearchable ways," could bestow on Peter such clarity in the midst of the many false claims about the identity of Christ. Christ begins to use Peter as an instrument--a Vicar--by which the Lord will open to the world, and "what he opens, no one shall shut." All that Peter is and does is from Christ, "for from him and through him and for him are all things."

Corrie ten Boom, in her book, “The Hiding Place” related how her family bravely aided Jews during the Holocaust. Eventually a Dutch informant found out about their work and told the Nazis. They were then captured and sent to prison camps. Corrie and her sister were sent to Ravensbruck, one of the worst concentration camps. They were greatly mistreated, never saw their parents again and her sister eventually died in the camp. Throughout it all Corrie forgave her captors. She wrote many books about the power of forgiveness.

Have you locked someone out of your heart because of pain, resentment or anger? Forgiveness is the key that will help you unlock the door to let the person back in to your heart and life. Forgiveness opens your heart to free you from your pain and focus on hope again. When we choose to love and forgive, we are opening the door to the kingdom of heaven. *Forgive, for heaven’s sake.”*

MASS DISPENSATION From the Indiana Bishops: “While commending our pastors and parish life coordinators who have gone to great lengths to assure safe worship spaces in our churches, due to the increase in the COVID- 19 cases in our state, the Indiana bishops have decided to extend the dispensation from the obligation of Sunday Mass attendance beyond August 15 until November 1, 2020, unless further developments determine otherwise.”

PRIESTLY CHANGES Father John will no longer celebrate Mass alone but will concelebrate with Father Bill Turner. Father Turner will be the Sacramental Minister for St Maurice and for St John Parish. If for some reason he is unable to celebrate the weekend Masses, Fr. Santhosh Yohannan will celebrate all the weekend Masses. St. John parish will have only one Mass, the 6:00 PM Saturday Mass. There will be no noon Mass there. **These changes begin the weekend of September 12-13.** Let us pray for all who will be affected by these changes.
