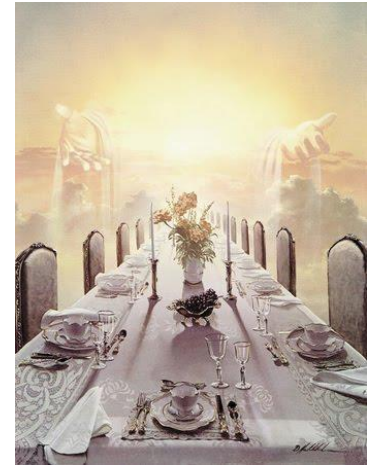

Sunday Readings

I have the strength for everything through Him who empowers me....My God will fully supply whatever you need, in accord with his glorious riches in Christ Jesus.

Matthew 22:1-14 or 22:1-10

Jesus said, “Go out, therefore, into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find.”

It is interesting to compare the long and short forms of this gospel. The long form really consists of two parables spliced together—the parable of the great banquet and the parable of the man without a wedding garment. Although it is difficult to be certain, it seems likely that the evangelist was responsible for combining the two parables. He interprets the gathering in of the ragtag from the streets allegorically as Jesus’ prediction of the subsequent Gentile mission and adds the second parable as a warning against their admission on too easy terms.

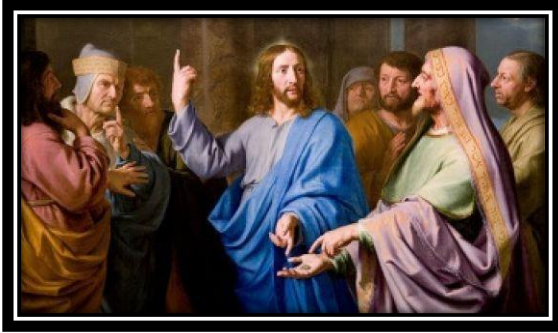
A WORD FROM POPE FRANCIS

**“Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar
and to God what Belongs to God.”**

In speaking the above words, Jesus is not issuing a dissertation on the intersection of politics, religion and the economy. But by his reply he has indicted the Pharisees and the Herodians for their inordinate concern about money versus what ought to be a concern for others.

His indictment should strike us too. Where are our concerns? Are we focused on money or on God? Are we sincere of heart, or are we scheming? It’s likely too flippant on our part to say with a sincere heart that we are focused only on God. Jesus’ words to his verbal opponents are addressed to us too. *“Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.”*

“Whose image is this and whose inscription?” They replied, “Caesar’s.” At that Jesus said to them, “Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God.”

Christ’s response to the false dilemma put to him by the Pharisees reveals that, though we owe obedience to just laws and rightful authority, we must also give God what belongs to God. And what does belong to God? Our very lives.
