December 31, 2023 - The Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary & Joseph



Today, the Church celebrates the Holy Family. Never was there such an extraordinary family. In our families, we and should imitate the virtues of Jesus, Mary and Joseph.

January 1, 2024 – The Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, The Mother of God



Today, on the first day of 2024, we remember the Blessed Virgin Mary.

When we proclaim with joy and gratitude that Mary is the Mother of God, we, with the Church, are simply proclaiming the One she gave birth to IS GOD!

God did not choose a queen of a kingdom. He did not choose anyone who was famous or influential. He chose a teenager from Nazareth to be His Mother. And He loved – and still loves – her dearly. St Maximilian Kolbe once said, "Never be afraid of loving the Blessed Virgin to much. You can never love her more than Jesus did."

However, Mary isn't only Jesus' mother. She is our mother, too (see Revelation 12:17). She loves us individually, and we can ask for her intercession for all of our needs.

Most importantly, the Blessed Mother wants us to seek her Son. Her last recorded words in Sacred Scripture are "Do whatever He tells you" (John 2:5). These words sum up her messages at Guadalupe, Lourdes and Fatima. She wants us to follow her

Son and to do whatever He tells us.

As we celebrate the Mother of God, Let us ask for her intercession. Is there a problem in your life? A loved one who has left the Faith" A health problem? A death you are mourning.

Just as she helped the young couple who ran out of wine in Cana, Mary will help you too. And, along with Mary, let us worship the Divine Infant in the Manger.
